



We are halfway through the Gospel of Mark, which is 16 chapters long. In the eighth chapter, we see the first person (Peter) name Jesus as the Messiah. Prior to that, we hear about Jesus being the Messiah in the opening of the gospel and some of the demons in the gospel seem to recognize His power. However, nobody seems to fully understand Jesus to that point.

In the eighth chapter, we also get a healing of a man who was blind in Mark 8:22-26. Jesus heals him for the most part. He can see ("people look like trees walking around," but not all the way. Jesus does the healing again. Then, the man has his sight fully restored.

Said alternatively, the eighth chapter is when peo-

ple start to figure out who Jesus is. Before that, people saw Jesus as a teacher or something similar. Within that same chapter, a man can see partly and then fully.


For me, this is life. We can only see part of the picture, especially in the beginning. Eventually, we can see more and more as we walk in the ways of Jesus. Sometimes, we figure it out to the point where we can see, but not all the way. Why stop there?

As I reflect upon the beauty of the eighth chapter of Mark, I see an invitation to be willing to continue to grow, learn, deconstruct, reconstruct, etc. Unfortunately, for some, faith is about getting to a point and staying put. The invitation from Jesus is to keep being a disciple (which means student!). There are countless ways to grow and learn at our church. I hope that you will join me on the journey by volunteering with or becoming part of one of our outreach ministries or small groups. These are fantastic ways to ensure that you don't become stagnant in your faith. If you have any questions such as where you might be able to grow, I am always eager to talk with you!

Resetting After the Fray TEXT: Mark 8:27-9:3 Rev. Dr. Jonathan B. Hall, Senior Pastor

On Sunday, we will look at the Transfiguration of Jesus in Mark 8:27-9:3. The idea of the Transfiguration has puzzled followers of Jesus for centuries. The idea of transformation means the change in form or appearance of Jesus. To better see the invitation in scripture, Pastor Jonathan will put this story into a larger narrative of Jesus feeling vulnerable, exhausted, and losing His patience amid a difficult conversation with His friends. What would it mean to be transfigured while feeling as if we are coming apart at the seams? Pastor Jonathan will share in his message entitled "Resetting After the Fray."


Bill Hayes, handsome singer, actor, writer, tapdancer, devoted husband, patriarch, and gentleman, was a beloved and unforgettable member of our church community.

Bill came to FCCNH in the spring of 1970. On his first Sunday, he was so delighted with the choir that after the service he asked choir director, Earle Immel, if he could join. fifty years later, in June of 2023, the chancel choir congratulated and honored Bill with a plaque commemorating his years of singing and naming the choir loft after him:the Bill Hayes Chancel Choir Loft.

Bill began his theatrical career on television in 1948. As a romantic boy tenor, he appeared for four seasons on the groundbreaking variety show *Your Show Of Shows*. He starred on Broadway in Rodgers and Hammerstein's musical *Me & Juliet*. In 1955 his recording of "The Ballad of Davy Crockett" topped the billboard charts as number one for months and earned him a gold record. He appeared on Ed Sullivan, Johnny Carson, United States Steel Hour, Hallmark Hall of Fame, and countless variety shows during television's golden age.

He was cast on NBC's soap opera, Days of Our Lives, creating the character of Doug Williams, that ran

deliciously for 54 years. His last appearance will air on Peacock on July 11th 2024. Also in the cast was Susan Seaforth. Their romance on-screen flourished as it did in real life. They were married by Pastor Bob Bock in 1974 "off-screen" and in 1976 "on Days." This unusual example of art imitating life earned them the cover of Time Magazine, January 12th, 1976. They both received Lifetime Achievement Daytime Emmy Awards in 2018.

During their five decades of church attendance with First Christian, they both performed in numerous Advent Theatre shows. Bill starred as Scrooge in the 1988 memorable production of Dicken's *A Christmas Carol*,

beautifully scored by Stephen Reinhardt. Bill gave many fundraising concerts for the church: The 1972 Pop Concert for the chancel organ; the 1980 benefit concert for the Haitian Mission Fund and the FCCNH building fund which helped install much needed A/C in our Sanctuary & Social Hall; the 1994 concert to fund repairs from the Northridge earthquake followed by a cabaret Thank You Benefit with church members Lillian and Morgan Stoddard, Jon and Susan Joyce, Alice Kawan and others, to reward the congregation for raising more than \$414,000 to "Raise the Roof" again.

He will long be remembered for his theatrical accomplishments, faith in God, and love for this church.

His longtime agent, Gregory Mayo, said of Bill, "He is simply the best that a person could ever hope to be."

Pastor Jonathan will be offering a different Ash Wednesday experience on **February 14**. During your lunch break (12pm to 1pm), you are invited to come to the church parking lot for a drive-thru spiritual experience! Free coffee and tea will be offered as well!

Most people associate "drive-thru" with burgers and fries, car washes, or coffee. The most spiritual experience for some in a "drive-thru" is getting coffee on a Monday morning. However, First Christian Church is offering "drive-thru" ashes on Ash Wednesday! This alternative to the traditional Ash Wednesday supper and service, which will begin at 5:45, is great for those who are unable to make the evening events.

Pastor Jonathan makes two unique options available for ashes. The first option is traditional ashes mixed with olive oil, gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The latter three parts honor the gifts that were given to Jesus by the magi. The second option is the same as the first with the addition of glitter as a way of publicly proclaiming faith and unity with the LGBTQ+community.

Receiving ashes on your forehead or the back of your hand using the palms from last year's Palm Sunday service is a way of reminding yourself that you are a human being. Most of us are good at being "human doings" with deadlines, to-do lists, etc. Ash Wednesday is an opportunity to remember that you are a "human being." Saying that, we need to remember the opportunity of being a better parent, colleague, friend, family member, etc.

After receiving the ashes, all are welcome to enjoy some silence in the prayer garden, chapel, or sanctuary. If you prefer not to receive ashes for any reason, you are welcome to simply pray with Pastor Jonathan.

WHAT IS A PASTOR'S CLASS?

Pastor's Class is a 6-week class for youth to connect their story to God's story. The class covers topics such as our local church, our denomination (Christian Church Disciples of Christ), baptism, scripture, and Lent to name a few. The youth will also have the opportunity to come up with a service project of their very own. At the end of the class, the youth will be baptized and recognized for their commitment.

WHFN

Our first class together will be NEXT WEDNESDAY, February 14th, at 5:30pm during the Ash Wednesday service. The remaining classes will be on the following Sundays (after worship):

The last gathering will be a brief meeting prior to baptisms during the 6:00am Easter Worship Service.

WHERE

Sunday classes will be hosted at the church in the Annex. This is the building behind the sanctuary.

MENTORS

A very important part of the class is the selection and presence of a youth mentor for each youth. The mentor is an adult, 23 years or older, who journeys along with your youth. They offer vital support and wisdom each week as the youth learn and engage. This year, we are giving youth participants the opportunity to reach out to an adult in the congregation and choose their mentor. We ask that there only be one mentor to one youth. We also ask that your youth inform us who they chose and confirmed with when the time comes.

If you are new to the church and not familiar with the congregation just yet, Pastor Jonathan and I could help you find someone you'd feel comfortable with.

RAPTISM

On Easter Sunday, March 31st at 6:00am, we will baptize all youth participants. Our youth are not only being baptized into the faith, but into this congregation. The mentors, teachers, and pastors will be present. We also invite you to share this with your family and friends who'd like to come.

LUNCHES

Once we identify who the mentors will be, I will reach out to them and figure out a schedule for lunches. It's easier to learn on a full stomach. If you can please inform me on your registration form of your youth's allergies and/or preferences that would be great.

REGISTRATION FORM

You should have received an email with the registration form for Pastor's Class. If you are interested and would like to sign up your youth for this opportunity, please do so soon. You can pick up and fill out a paper copy and submit it to me, or scan the completed form and email it to me. Paper copies will be available at the church entrance. The deadline to submit forms is Sunday, February 11th.

ABSENCE OR WITHDRAWAL FROM THE CLASS

If at any point your youth is going to miss a class, arrive late, leave early, or withdraw, please inform me at least 24 hours in advance. We strongly encourage all participants to attend each full class. Any materials that are missed, makes it difficult to catch up. Please be sure to plan for these classes each week.
